Last month's story was of the past and present mayors. By error, I didn't include words from Tom LeSage. This is from Tom's daughter, Emilie LeSage Moss. "Tom was very excited when he won his bid for mayor in 2002. He had previously run in 1994 and 1998. As being born and raised in Bergen, he had a lot of pride in the village and had an open-door policy."



Now onto January's story. Today we recognize Marian Thornell Partridge. She was born in 1928 and will be 96 years young this July. Marian grew up on a farm on Batavia Byron Rd. Marian and her sister, Helen, were their only children. Their father said that Marian and Helen were their hired hands. Marian went to South Byron School and graduated high school in 1946. After high school, Marian received a full scholarship to the University of Rochester to become a nurse. She lasted two months. She was homesick and during that time, one of her teachers at the U of R talked about a patient that had died and how it would have been a good learning experience for Marian to observe this dead man. Marian was upset with the lack of compassion for this man, and that he had passed away. Marian left the U of R and returned home. She worked at Sleights's bookstore in Batavia. Returning home to the Thornell family farm, Marian met her husband, Dick as his brother, Lewis

worked on the family farm. When the next school year came around, (1947), Marian's father told her that she should pack her bags and go to school so that she didn't end up an old maid like her Aunt Florence and cousin Pauline. Marian went to Buffalo State College for four years. She majored in Home Economics and graduated in 1951 with a bachelor's degree. Meanwhile, Dick had joined the Air Force. During that time Dick and Marian became engaged. They were married in 1952. In October of 1954, the young couple moved to their forever home on Rochester Street here in the village. In early January of 1955, their first child, Bruce, was born. In 1957, their second child, Jan, was born. Marian began her career teaching Home Economics in Elba. She taught full time for three years. After her children were born, she was a substitute teacher in Elba and Byron-Bergen. She became full time in the early 1960's, and taught 7th and 8th grade Home Economics, at Byron-Bergen until her retirement in 1983. She taught cooking, sewing, babysitting and family relations. Today we know that as Family and Consumer Science. (FACS)

Marian and Dick's life in the village was story-book sweet with great neighbors. Austin and Gladys Morley (owner of Morley Motors), Monica and Morris Cunningham (Monica was the town clerk), Don and Helen Schaffer (Don was the principal at the Bergen Elementary school), and George and Josephine Beedham (George was the highway superintendent for Bergen and they were also my grandparents).

I asked Marian if there was a particular story that she remembered from teaching. She said that while substitute teaching in Elba, she told the class their lesson for the day. Well, several girls from the class had another idea for the lesson. After hearing their idea, Marian hesitated and declared, "No we will stick with the lesson I have planned." A pretty, little blonde girl said that if you don't let us do the lesson that we want to do then we will um, um call you by your first name. How times have changed with students today.

Marian has been active on many committees and boards. To name a few, the Republican committee, the planning board (almost 30 years), the Triangle Club, and many committees for the Methodist Church.

What a heartwarming day I had spending time with Marian. She is just as sweet as I remember her as my 7th and 8th grade Home Economics teacher. Marian starts every day and ends every day the same way. She reads her Daily Devotionals. We could all learn a lot from Marian Partridge.
