From the Desk of the Village Historian, Vicky Truax

Today's story is about the Mojo Hut which was housed at the Presbyterian Church in the village.

In 1965 the young people were rebelling. The Vietnam War was going on. The pastor at the Presbyterian Church was Dave Broad and he was something of a rebel in politics and civil affairs. Dave challenged all people, but especially the youth, to think and then define the problems and do something about them instead of just sitting around complaining.

So, this is what the youth did. In a letter to the Session of the church, they wrote, "We the members of the Youth Fellowship feel that there is a need for a place for village teenagers to meet. We would like to use the Service Building of our church every other Friday night. Since there are no other accommodations for the village teenagers, this would be a community service." Much to the kid's surprise, the Session agreed. A board was formed. The Presbyterian members were Lenore Wilcox, Vickie Almquist, Bruce Miller, Daryl Swartz, Steven Almquist, and Bill Blue. Ken Hay was from the Methodist Church and Dennis Sapienza, represented the Catholics. As far as can be determined, Larry Crosby was the only adult brave enough to help them by being on the board.

The name of the place was the Mojo Hut. Bill Blue came up with that name. The first meeting was April 15, 1965. There was a pool table, ping pong table and a phonograph player. Gingham cloths decorated the card tables. Pop and snacks were available.

It was a success far beyond their imagination. People broke the rules, including some of the board members. The cleanup got harder and harder and the Mojo Hut lasted until the end of summer.

After asking some locals that attended, this is what they remembered.

Dennis McCartney – His family grocery store closed at 9 pm. He remembers running home, showering, and running to the Hut. There were a lot of kids there. The band was playing, and kids were dancing There was a line at the pool table, waiting their turn to be the next champions. The older guys were racing their cars and doing burn outs on Lake St. The 50's and 60's were a great time to grow up in.

Steve Almquist was a junior in high school. The Mojo Hut name sounded cool, and it had an island theme to it. Most Fridays they had local bands come in and play. There was a cover charge of \$1.00 and this paid the band. Some Fridays it was a packed house, and after a while, we had kids from other school districts coming. Continued on page 2...


